THE WHITBY HOME-SCHOOL PACT

Draft

This agreement reflects our shared commitment to the values of Patience, Ambition, Consistency and Thoughtfulness.

P - Have I been patient in dealing with concerns?

School will

- aim to respond to emails and concerns within five working days
- we will prioritise cases that relate to the immediate safety of children
- communicate clearly about who to contact and when
- keep families informed about the progress of any ongoing concerns.

Home will:

- understand that thorough investigations take time
- communicate respectfully and allow time for responses
- recognise that staff may not be able to respond outside of working hours
- approach concerns calmly and constructively.

A - Am I ambitious for my child's education?

School will:

- hold high aspirations for every pupil
- monitor and support progress through tracking systems
- celebrate pupils' achievements and character development
- provide a broad, balanced, and adaptive curriculum that supports all learners
- offer opportunities for pupils to develop leadership, creativity, and independence.

Home will:

- encourage excellent attendance
- support homework routines
- attend parents' and carers' evenings and engage with school staff
- encourage my child to take pride in their learning and achievements

support my child in setting goals and celebrating progress.

C – Together do we support **consistency** with our school policies?

School will:

- apply policies fairly and transparently across all pupils
- communicate clearly about expectations and concerns
- provide clear explanations for decisions and sanctions where necessary.

Home will:

- ensure my child adheres to the uniform policy
- engage with ClassCharts
- support the school's detention policy
- read and support the school's policies, including behaviour and mobile phone use
- notify the school of any changes to contact details or circumstances that may affect learning.

T – Are we **thoughtful** in interactions between home and school?

School will:

- listen to and consider feedback from families
- maintain respectful and open communication
- work collaboratively with families to support each pupil
- recognise and respond to individual needs and circumstances
- reflect on feedback to improve school practice and culture.

Home will:

- communicate respectfully and openly
- use the school's complaints policy and process to give us an opportunity to make things right before sharing concerns publicly
- work together with the school for my child's best interest
- treat all members of the school community with respect.

PROSPECT HILL SITE DEVELOPMENTS AND UPDATES

We have been in discussions with the Local Authority for some time regarding improving the safety of pupils on our Prospect Hill Site, due to the nature of the site, which has a number of different buildings added over time, resulting in the reception area being behind other buildings. It has taken some time to secure the necessary funding for the improvements we believe will improve this situation to better safeguard pupils on this site. We are now pleased to tell you that we have permission to move forward with these plans, with funding being provided by the Local Authority. To prevent unauthorised access to and around our site, we have commissioned some fencing to be installed around the front perimeter of the buildings on the

Prospect Hill Site which will direct everyone to the front of the school and also prevent pupils following footballs onto the school driveway. Unauthorised access will then be prevented to other areas of the school. The fencing works will begin around October half term (date still to be confirmed at the time of writing) and we expect that this installation will take approximately three weeks to complete. Gates in the necessary areas of the new fencing will be linked to the fire alarm along the fire escape routes. This work also necessitates the relocation of our current reception to the front of the current Sixth Form Centre building. We are still awaiting permission to move forward with relocating the reception and back office to this area





and so we expect that there will be a transition period once the new fencing is installed before the new reception area is completed. We have involved the Sixth Form Student Council in these plans and will work with students to put in place what they would like to see in their changed Sixth Form area. We have been looking at where we can provide additional social and study areas for our Sixth Form students so that they will continue to have suitable, dedicated space on the site which they can be happy with.

The wider Student Council has contributed ideas leading to a number of improvements we have been able to put in place across the school, achieved with some external grant funding from the Woodsmith

Foundation. This has resulted in us purchasing three new outdoor table tennis tables for pupil use, providing some additional outdoor seating and also relocating and filling some planters which pupils will maintain going forwards.

Local Authority officers have also approached us recently in respect of the possibility of a bus layby being installed in front of our Prospect Hill Site which would allow coaches to pull in off the main road when collecting and dropping off pupils. This is still in early stages of planning and so we cannot confirm that it will go ahead at the current time. The Council are currently undertaking a feasibility study in this respect.



PERSONAL STATEMENT UPDATE

This week Sixth Form students began writing their UCAS personal statements. This is a challenging task and we would be very appreciative of your support with the process. You can best support your child if they are applying to university by helping them follow a clear, practical process. Start with research: encourage them to read course descriptions, look at attending open days or speak to student ambassadors via UCAS and specific universities so they can cite specific modules or topics they're excited about. Help them mind-map their ideas, build a bank of academic and extracurricular examples that would support their chosen course, and rank the most relevant evidence for their chosen course.

Remind them the statement has three linked sections: why they want to study the subject, how their studies prepared them, and what they've done outside school. Aim for reflective sentences that explain what was learned and how it relates to the course; avoid simply listing grades or repeating information. UCAS allows 4,000 characters in total and each of the three sections needs a minimum 350 characters.

Al can help brainstorm or tighten phrasing but must not produce the final text. Universities will be checking and the responses to the questions needs to be something that the student has crafted themselves. If you feel you need any further information or help please let us know.





FOOTBRIDGE SAFETY AND COMMUNITY NOTICES

We would like to remind families and members of the community that Whitby School has responsibility for the footbridge connecting the lower school site to Airy Hill Primary School. While we are still working with North Yorkshire Council to confirm the full extent of our obligations, they continue to support us with aspects of the bridge's maintenance.

In the meantime, we kindly ask that banners or other items are not displayed or fixed to the bridge railings. While we understand the desire to share messages and promote local events, we are concerned that banners or other items could become loose and

fall into the road below, creating a potential hazard for vehicles and pedestrians.

We are grateful for the community's support in keeping this area safe. Any banners that are displayed, or other items that are fixed to the bridge, will need to be removed. Banners may be collected from the school at an agreed time where necessary. This would need to be organised by telephoning the school within ten days. After this time, the school will need to dispose of the item due to lack of suitable storage space.


The following article is from the Whitby Foghorn publication, written by Whitby Foghorn and Isaac.



Challenge myself

My inspiration was to challenge myself, I like to try and push myself out of my comfort zone and when I set my mind to something it's all I focus on. Whilst I was planning this run our family friend was posting videos of her son Barney's achievements. He has autism and is nearly five and it showed him hitting some huge milestones, communicating via his talking device, actually verbally saying a word for the first time, going new places and trying new things and I felt so proud of him, I said to My mum I'm going to do this marathon for a charity for Barney. We knew Barney and his family accessed WHISH and I knew that's who I wanted to do it for.

WHISH is set up to help families navigating unique challenges associated with autism and ADHD and many other hidden impairments. They offer a safe space, a haven free from judgement and understanding. Barney and his family have had plenty of challenges in his young life but WHISH doesn't just support Barney, they support the whole family and genuinely believe that every child deserves to feel safe and accepted. Childhood can be hard and it doesn't need to be made harder because of a disability, people should acknowledge accept and help. WHISH supports people on this journey and I'm proud to be running for them. My target is £1,000 and so far I have raised £915 via a go fund me page where the money goes direct to the charity.

SIXTH FORM SUBJECT FOCUS: BUSINESS

Do you have the drive and ambition to manage a business, or ooze enthusiasm to become an entrepreneur? Are you creative enough to market worldwide products or organised enough to manage a business's finances? If so, then a course in business may be the right option for you. A business course at Whitby School will guide you to understand the ins and outs of businesses, exploring how different factors can test a business and push them to succeed. You will create a marketing campaign for a large business of your choice that someday may become a reality, and work with worldwide companies to investigate their finances. The units that you will cover are the core to any successful business and, one day, you could be the successful business that students are investigating. This course encourages independent learning, and with one-to-one support, passionate teachers and real business scenarios, you will develop the skills and knowledge to become successful in any workplace.

What do students do afterwards?

Many business students guarantee themselves a place at university by studying a business course. A Level 3 qualification in business is recognised in most universities. If university is not the place for you then there is always the option of a higher apprenticeship.



BTEC business students have, in the past, landed themselves an apprenticeship in top businesses, such as GCHQ and Anglo American, and more and more businesses are taking on apprentices who have a business background.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about YOUTH VIOLENCE

UNDERSTANDING YOUTH VIOLENCE

Youth violence affects one in four children in the UK, but it doesn't have to. When parents, carers, and educators understand the risks, they're better placed to support young people. The right support, mentoring, therapy, and guidance can help young people affected by violence to feel safe, manage conflict, and make positive choices.

WHY DO YOUNG PEOPLE COMMIT SERIOUS VIOLENCE?

A recent study surveyed over 10,000 young people affected by violence, asking why serious violence occurs among their peers, such as an assault involving a weapon or sexual violence. The most common reasons given were due to a personal characteristic of the victim e.g., race, religion, sexuality, gender, a gang or school rivalry, and being provoked. While not all young people face these issues, many lack the emotional regulation skills needed to manage provocation.

WHAT ARE SIGNS A YOUNG PERSON IS AT RISK?

Children and young people often express that something is wrong through behaviour rather than words. Be alert to signs such as sudden mood changes, secrecy around friendships, excessive phone use, unfamiliar slang, unexplained injuries, fear of school, aggression, going missing, or substance use. They may also be associating with older peers. These behaviours can indicate underlying issues that can lead to violence.

ONLINE INFLUENCES

Social media plays a powerful role in normalising and escalating violence. Platforms like TikTok and Snapchat can expose young people to harmful content, often shaped by algorithms. Many see violent material that distorts reality, leading to fear and desensitisation. A recent study found 70% had seen real-world violence online, and 80% felt less safe in their communities. Alarmingly, 39% said it made them more likely to carry a weapon. Online conflict can often spill into real life, with serious and sometimes tragic consequences.

WHEN IS VIOLENCE MORE LIKELY TO HAPPEN?

For children and young people in England and Wales, the hours between 4 pm and 8 pm – just after school – carry a particularly high risk for serious violence. This can stem from conflicts that escalate during the school day, online arguments, or simply moving through unfamiliar areas on the way home. Understanding this risk helps us support safer travel and routines. Our recent report found that over one in three young people don't feel safe in the area they live in, and 36% don't feel safe walking the streets.

WHY MIGHT A YOUNG PERSON CARRY A WEAPON?

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Young people may carry weapons due to fear, threats, peer pressure, or a false sense of protection. Many young people tell us they feel unsafe and carry weapons 'just in case', while others may be influenced by social media, peers, or criminal activity. Some don't realise it's illegal or may believe it earns respect.

WHERE IS VIOLENCE MORE LIKELY TO HAPPEN?

Violence often happens in certain places. Busy areas like transport hubs carry risk simply because lots of people gather there. Other hotspots, like places linked to drug activity, attract those more likely to be involved in violence. Some areas become risky due to poor supervision, such as under-resourced public spaces. Understanding where violence tends to occur helps us guide young people safely through their communities and advocate for better support and safer spaces.

Advice for Parents & Educators

TALKING TO CHILDREN ABOUT STAYING SAFE

Choose a safe moment for the conversation, emotionally and physically. If a child is upset or angry, help them settle before discussing serious topics. Listen actively without judgement, even if what they share is difficult. Avoid interrupting and offer advice when the time feels right. If you're worried, you're not alone; support is available.

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AVOID CONFLICT & MANAGE ESCALATIONS

Encourage young people to consider the 'Safe T's' – Trust instincts, Take a breath, and Talk to a trusted adult. When triggered or provoked, they may react from their 'survival brain', unable to think clearly about the consequences. Taking a breath helps calm, and helps them access their 'thinking brain'. Remind them that moments pass, and seeking support from trusted adults builds resilience and safer decision-making.

HELP CHILDREN UNDERSTAND CONSEQUENCES

Young people can be searched by police or teachers if suspected of carrying a weapon. If found with a knife, they could face arrest and criminal proceedings. A conviction can result in a criminal record. Even being present during a violent assault, encouraging it, filming, or sharing footage can lead to prosecution. Open and honest conversations can help children understand these risks and make safer choices.

REPORT INFORMATION

We all have a role in preventing violence. If a child shares concerns, you can act. For educators, it's important to follow your school's safeguarding procedures. Other adults can report anonymously through Fearless or Crimestoppers, and speak with other parents, the school, or local police through 101. If someone is in immediate danger, always call 999. These steps help protect children and the wider community.
