Update on our promotion of Protected Characteristics

I'd like to share with you our focus on ensuring that every member of our school community feels included and valued.

We work to ensure that our pupils understand that:

- there are no outsiders here
- everyone is different and unique
- we celebrate our differences
- we are all equal.

The Equality Act became law in 2010. It covers everyone in Britain and protects people from discrimination, harassment and victimisation. Everyone in Britain is protected. This is because the Equality Act protects people against discrimination because of the protected characteristics that we all have. Under the Equality Act, there are nine Protected Characteristics:

- 1. Age
- 2. Disability
- 3. Gender reassignment
- 4. Race
- 5. Religion or belief
- 6. Marriage or civil partnership
- 7. Sex
- 8. Sexual orientation
- 9. Pregnancy and maternity

We actively promote protected characteristics in our curriculum and work to embed them into our ethos through:

- our school vision and core values
- assemblies, tutor time, RE lessons and PSHE lessons.
- our school behaviour policy makes our expectations clear and reinforces the importance of showing respect for all cultures
- conscious role modelling by all adults in the school community
- the promotion of British values in school life
- every member of the community knowing that whatever they report will be dealt with appropriately and followed up
- any prejudiced incident that takes place is seen as an opportunity to reflect, learn and make better choices next time.

We use data recorded on our CPOMs safeguarding system in order to analyse the effectiveness of our work; the main areas we assess are attendance, suspensions, racial incidents, bullying incidents, homophobic incidents and any other prejudice related incidents.

I hope this information is useful and reinforces our school ethos of creating a truly inclusive and welcoming culture.

SIXTH FORM SPORTS STUDENTS TRIP

Last Thursday a group of Whitby School Sixth Form students undertook a fantastic enhancement and enrichment opportunity as part of their Level 3 BTEC Sport course. This was specifically linked to *Unit 22:* 'Business in the Sport and Active Leisure Industry'. Students visited the University Campus of Football Business (UCFB) in Salford Quays, and did a tour of the Manchester City FC stadium with Mr and Mrs Mastrolonardo.


The Manchester City FC stadium tour explored the commercial use of the stadium, as well as its primary

purpose of hosting sporting events predominantly for

Manchester City. It also explored how different aspects of the club are run as part of a profitable business, as well as a lucrative fan experience and brand awareness activity.

Students then went to UCFB at Media City, Salford where they were given an insight into UCFB and the many sport and football industry related degree courses that are on offer linked with areas like law,





media, journalism, marketing, business and management, coaching and talent development, PE, sports broadcasting, stadium and events management, sports psychology etc.

There was also a *Careers in Sport* lecture; guest lecture session on globalisation of football, FFP/PSR, transfers, multi club ownership linked to our course via the PESTLE business model. This was followed by a personal statement session – introduction to the UCAS process.

In addition to this visit, two guest speakers will visit our Year 13 BTEC Level 3 Sports students from 'Runna' the app that offers customized training plans (from 5k to ultramarathons) developed by world-class runners and Olympians as well as the Head of Europe for 'Coros Sports Technology'. This will happen at the end of November.

HEALTH MATTERS DURING THE WINTER MONTHS

Respiratory infections are common at this time of year. Symptoms can be caused by several respiratory infections including the common cold, COVID-19, flu, and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV).

For most individuals, these illnesses will not be serious and they soon recover.

People with respiratory infections can experience a range of symptoms including a runny nose, high temperature, cough and sore throat.

It is not possible to tell which germ someone is infected with based on symptoms alone.

Some children aged 2 years and under, especially those with a heart condition or born prematurely, and very young infants, are at increased risk of hospitalisation from RSV.

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. Sneezing, coughing, singing and talking may spread respiratory droplets from an infected person to someone close by. Droplets from the mouth or nose may also contaminate hands, eating and drinking utensils, toys or other items and spread to those who may use or touch them, particularly if they then touch their nose or mouth.

To prevent the spread of such infections, please can you remind your child about the importance of good handwashing, which should be done regularly throughout the day, and other good hygiene practices such as taking care when using tissues to ensure these are disposed of in a bin, etc. This should help to prevent the spread of common illnesses during the winter months.

Please note that the government recommends that children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, who are otherwise well, should continue to attend school.



SIXTH FORM SUBJECT FOCUS: ENGLISH LITERATURE

What will I study?

Words matter. Wars are started over them. Great love affairs happen because of them. Studying English literature will give you the chance to read, think and discuss. In a world filled with 140 characters, Instagram and Snapchat, how often do you get the chance to fully absorb yourself in a good book? From Dracula to The Handmaid's Tale, A-level literature is about amazing novels, poems and plays. Through these great literary texts, students get to grips with a range of texts covering a range of important issues, helping them to think about the world around them and to question and consider everything. Our students are often creative writers, as well as enthusiastic readers and participate in a range of literary competitions. In addition, students will have access to a range of exciting theatre trips.

What do students do afterwards?

Last year, 100% of our students gained a grade C or above; 66% gained A/A* grades. Students have gone on to study English literature, history, psychology and media-based degrees. Some are enjoying careers in the media, such as SKY and Channel 4 and others are continuing their studies at top establishments such as Oxford University.

How will I be assessed?

80% exam; 20% coursework.

What can I do to prepare?

Talk to other students who are already doing the course and ask them what they have done or wish they had done.
Read widely; anything that takes your fancy and inspires you to think and discuss.





REVISION FOCUS: SCIENCE COMBINED AND TRIPLE

Buy a revision guide - you can get CGP revision guides from the science department office.

Catch up any missed lessons/topics or revisit areas you are stuck on, using these videos:

Free Science Lessons
YouTube.

Do some regular exam paper practice.

Use all the resources Mrs Fleming has put on Google Classroom INCLUDING the week-by-week revision plan.

Arrange to see a science teacher if you are stuck on anything specific. After school intervention starts later in the year and you will be told about it.

You will have six exams, two each for biology, chemistry and physics.

Things to do for the exam:

- **DO** bring your own calculator to EVERY science exam. You know how yours works, what if you are lent one that you don't know how to use?
- DO look through the paper before you start so you know what questions are coming up
- **DO** read the questions properly circle/underline the action words, names of chemicals etc
- DO look carefully at how many boxes to tick or lines to draw
- DO go for the 'easy wins' answer the questions you can do first, skip anything you get really stuck on and go back to it later. You don't have to answer the questions in order
- **DON'T** leave blanks or write 'I don't know!'. Have a go at all the questions
- REMEMBER a line of best fit on a graph can be a straight line OR a smooth curve - it must go as close as possible to as many points as possible, but don't include any obvious anomalous result!

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

AI-GENERATED VIDEOS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Al-generated videos are increasingly difficult to spot and easy to share. From fake news clips to deepfake abuse, children and young people face new risks every day online. These videos can imitate real people, spread false narratives or even generate harmful content from scratch. Understanding these dangers is crucial for schools and families who want to protect children in a fast-evolving digital world.

RECTOR

DEEPFAKE ABUSE CONTENT

Shockingly, artificial intelligence is now being exploited to create child sexual abuse material (CSAM). These synthetic images and videos are a form of digital abuse, often generated by manipulating real children's photos, including ones shared innocently online. Worryingly, the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) has identified a sharp rise in this disturbing trend. Whether real or Al-generated, this content causes lasting a criminal offence under UK law.

BLURRED REALITY

Regular exposure to fake content can erode a child's trust in real-world evidence. If everything can be faked, they may begin to question genuine videos – including actual abuse or injustice. This is known as the 'liar' dividend', where real harm is dismissed as fake news. It can discourage victims from coming forward or speaking up.

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USED FOR BULLYING

Deepfake technology is already being used by peers to create embarrassing or explicit clips of classmates. These videos can be edited to appear as though a child said or did earted to appear as though a child said of aid something they never did. Once shared, they are almost impossible to delete completely. Al-generated bullying adds a new layer of harm that is deeply personal and difficult to prove.

EMOTIONAL MANIPULATION

strong emotions, including fear, anger or guilt.
False footage of crying children, injured animals or burning buildings may be created purely for clicks, donations or political influence. Children may feel upset or powerless, unaware that what they are watching has been digitally invented to manipulate their reaction.

DISINFORMATION

Al-generated videos can spread fake news, making it harder for children to separate fact from fiction. False clips may include deepfake interviews, hoax disasters or fabricated health claims. Al is already being used to produce misleading or persuasive material that appears authentic. If they don't develop media literacy, children may accept false content as truth.

IMPERSONATION



FAKE NEWS

With just a few photos or voice clips, AI tools can mitate someone's appearance or speech. This makes it easier for scammers or bullies to create fake videos of children, teachers or celebrities These impersonations can be used for fraud, harassment or humiliation – and can spread quickly through social media or group chats, due to the viral potential of video, in particular

Advice for Parents & Educators

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TEACH HOW IT WORKS

Explain to children that videos can be faked - and show them how. Demonstrating side-by-side examples of real vs Al-generated clips helps to build awareness. Discuss how faces, voices and even movements can be copied by machines. Understanding the technology reduces fear and builds confidence in navigating digital content safely.

ENCOURAGE CRITICAL QUESTIONS

Help children question what they watch. Who made this? Why was it made? Is it trying to persuade me? These habits encourage digital thinking, especially when videos seem too shocking or convenient. Reinforce that not everything shared by friends or influencers is true, even if it looks convincing at first, and that the initial

TALK ABOUT TRUST

Always keep lines of communication open. If a child sees something upsetting or unbelievable, they should feel safe discussing it without judgement. Create an environment where they know they will not get in trouble for asking questions. This also helps you step in quickly if harmful content has been

STRENGTHEN PRIVACY SETTINGS

Advise children not to share voice notes, selfies or personal videos on public platforms. Al tools often scrape content from social media to create deepfakes. Use privacy controls to limit who can see their content and turn off facial recognition where possible. Fewer public images means fewer





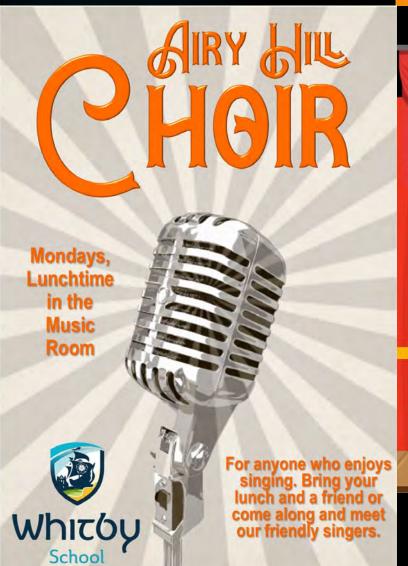
