HEADTEACHER'S WELCOME

It was a pleasure to welcome Year 9 parents and carers into school this week for our Options Evening. At the same time, I am working with my colleagues to interview our Year 11 following their mock examinations to talk about their next steps and to see how we can support them with their revision. With this in mind, my assembly for Year 11 this week was about aiming high. Ambition is one of our school values after all.

How we manage our child's expectations, ambitions, and hopes for the future can be very challenging as a parent. I remember my youngest son asking me some years ago if I thought he could be an astronaut when he grew up. I remember being asked that once in a careers lesson and I knew from researching it that to be astronaut requires at least a degree in physics, engineering or biology – and sometimes even a PhD. I also knew that even if you meet the entry requirements, you only have a 0.6% chance of being selected.

This is why I told Year 11 about the story of Katherine Johnson - one of my heroes - in assembly this week. She was born in 1910 in West Virginia, USA. As a child she showed great promise in mathematics. However, the district she lived in did not allow African American children a free education after the age of 13. Her father, a farmer, was keen to help her with her education. He had huge belief in his daughter. He would tell her:



"You are no better than anyone else. And no one is better than you."

He worked long hours and many jobs to send both Katherine and her mother to live 125 miles away – just over the county line – so she could attend school. In fact, she went to university – and then became a teacher. A great achievement - however, her story doesn't end there.

During World War 2 many men lost their lives and as a result, some jobs that had been only for men became available to women. In 1952 she started working for the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics – later called NASA. She was a "computer" – a term for someone who does mathematics. In fact, computers are given that name because when they were invented, this was the job they were created to replace.

The computers were segregated by race. Katherine worked with other African American computers. The laws at the time meant separate toilets, cafeterias and even different seats on the buses depending on the colour of a person's skin. Nevertheless, Katherine worked so hard and was so good at calculations that one day she found herself loaned out to the Flight Research Division: a top secret team set up with one aim: to beat the Russians into space. She soon finds herself being invited to the previously all male, all white meetings.

Sadly, in 1956 her husband died, but Katherine continued to work while raising her three children as a single mother. At NASA she starts working on

determining azimuth angles – the exact calculations needed to send a rocket into orbit. Getting the calculation wrong would mean astronauts could come crashing to earth – or spiral off into space forever, never to return.

When this is accomplished, she helps devise the calculations that send the first ship to the moon. Imagine the complexity of that. The moon is far further away than it seems. Each of the planets in the solar system could fit between the Earth and the moon and still have space left over. On top of that, it is orbiting the earth at just over a thousand kilometers a second. Katherine and her team need to calculate the exact timing, angles and speed to get there – and back.

And they do.

This lack of equality and the challenges faced by people with protected characteristics now and in the past is a key part of our curriculum. Katherine faced obstacles due to her race and her gender but she endeavoured with courage and determination. Her character is an inspiration. But then so is the courage

and determination of the brave men who climbed into a metal capsule not knowing if they would come back. It must have seemed impossible.

So, to a child who asks if they can be an astronaut – or an artist, or a doctor, or a mechanic, or a vet, or an actor, or a musician – we can say... why not?

"You are no better than anyone else. And no one is better than you."

Shoot for the moon, Whitby. Be ambitious.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about MS AND FAKE

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? "Fake news" refers to falsified or misleading material presented as a legitimate account of events. It's often used by malicious actors online to push an agenda, or even by criminals as a way of making scams more persuasive. Scammers can trick us into handing over personal information, security details and even our hard-earned cash.

"CLICKBAIT" PHISHING

A message arrives saying "Have you seen this video of yourself?" or you might be sent an attention-grabbing headline about a celebrity that's been shared on social media. This kind of "bait" is produced by scammers to drive us to click on an unsafe link, where malware could be downloaded to our devices. These scams rely on our curiosity and our "need-to-know" instinct.

SALES, DEALS & DISCOUNTS

Some scams appear as adverts, offering a products, expensive gadgets or tickets to a popular show – at a reduced price. Such ploys often include a time limit or countdown, urging us to hurry so we don't miss out on the deal. This pressure encourages us to input personal details or payment information before pausing to check if it's legitimate.

YOU'RE A WINNER!

This kind of scam involves fake giveaways opportunities or freebies. It could be a message saying we've won a prize draw or competition.
Or it could be a gift, free trial, bonus credit, and
suchlike. It might claim that a package or refund is waiting. All these techniques are used to prompt us to share our personal information, thinking that there's something to be gained by

FALSE FRIENDSHIPS

Scammers often pretend to be someone they're not to gain their victims' trust. They might attempt to convince any children they connect with that they're a child of similar age with shared interests. Warning signs include a high volume of messages (often with an intense tone), secrecy, inappropriate levels of intimacy, guilt tripping, emotional manipulation, threats or blackmail.

PANIC MODE

claim that a child's account has been hacked, or a virus has been installed on their device, or any number of other scary scenarios. They may claim to be able to fix the problem or offer a solution – if the child hands over control of the device or sensitive information. Similar scams involve impersonating a friend or relative, claiming that they're in trouble and need help

FAKE CELEBRITY ENDORSEMENTS



Impersonating influential people online is a common tactic for scammers, who can use technology to create fake photos, audio and even videos that look authentic. These can be used to convince us, for example, to buy products, sign up for so-called "business opportunities" or invest in cryptocurrency schemes – all of which are fake or otherwise malicious. Many scams also involve the impersonation of popular companies' so media accounts, as well as those of individuals

Advice for Parents & Educators

STAY INFORMED

Stay up to date with the latest information and best practice on cyber-security. See what scam stories are reported in the news and make note of what tactics were used. Keep up with young people's digital lives: talk

ENCOURAGE HEALTHY SCEPTICISM

Most scams rely on emotional or psychological manipulation, tapping into our human instincts – whether that's to keep ourselves safe, help others, find answers make friends, avoid losing out or to secure something we really want. Encourage especially if what's on offer sounds too good to be true.

TALK TOGETHER

Chat often and openly with young people about fake news, online scams and how they both work. Encourage them to talk to you about anything they're unsure of or worried about online. If a child claims to have been scammed, don't pass judgement. Blaming the victim may deter young people from asking you for help. Remember: adults are scammed just as often, if not more.

Children increasingly use digital devices for education, socialising, shopping and olay. Don't wait for a problem to arise before you discuss the risk of scams, false Information and fake news. Highlight what to look out for and clearly communicate




