## READING GROUP BOOK REVIEW

The Whitby School reading group are currently taking part in the Carnegie Reading Prize competition. We read a selection of new Young Reader books and vote for our favourite in June. Our vote will contribute to the national vote from schools around the country and

the winning book will win the Carnegie Reading Prize for 2025.

We are well into our reading now and some firm favourites are emerging. Here are two reviews from our readers.

### The Final Year – by Poppy and Eva

When we first picked up this novel we were surprised to find the whole novel was a poem. We weren't sure whether we would like this format at first or not but we have been really impressed with this form. The poem style is a little confusing at first but we soon got used to it. It actually makes for a fast paced read and the pace of action and events makes it an exciting read. There are not moments when the paces seems to drag. The Final Year is very good because it shows different points of view and shows how going into a different space can be very hard for people. The characters are realistic and we feel how nervous they are and scared at times in the story. It is a book I feel many young people could relate to as we may have felt the same feelings of trepidation as the character. This is one of our clear favourites at the moment.



### Glasgow Boys – by Ellie and Paige

Glasgow boys is a fun, mysterious book that keeps you on the edge of your seat. In the beginning we are introduced to the two main characters Banjo and Finley although they live separate lives their stories are intertwined. Margaret McDonald uses a dual narrative for the two main characters. Having both of our protagonists' point of view keeps you hooked as we see their different perspectives as the plot unravels. We found the book very easy to read as the flow of the story isn't confusing although it may seem to be with the two separate narrators. Overall, we believe that the book is an easy but enticing read that really resonates with our age group.





## WILD BIRDS UPDATE

Further to our previous article on our regular visiting Mallard, Jemima, and her ducklings, we thought it would be helpful to provide some information about looking after wild birds in general. Please note that we sought professional advice before moving the ducklings and their mum, and encourage anyone wishing to assist wildlife to do the same.

Bird numbers are declining at an alarming rate - even the common sparrow has decreased by over 70% in some areas over the last thirty years. Because of this, it is important that we all do what we can to ensure that wild birds can have a successful nesting season.

If you find a baby bird, the first instinct can be to pick it up and try to take care of it. Unfortunately, this can reduce the bird's chance of survival, and you may be breaking the law in doing so. In England, all wild

birds are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1982 and later amendments. The following is what you can do:

- **Finding a baby bird with no feathers.** Unfortunately, the bird is unlikely to survive and therefore, there would be no harm in you trying to replace it into its nest as quickly as possible. Wear gloves to do this, however, as many parent birds will abandon babies that smell of human contact.
- **Finding a baby bird with feathers.** It is common for babies almost ready to fly to fall out of their nest or fly a short distance. Usually, the parents will hear the baby calling and will keep feeding it where it shelters. If you find a baby bird with feathers out in the open, try not to touch it but encourage it into some form of shelter, eg, under a nearby bush. Keep





your pets well away from it and watch as best you can to see if the parents are still looking after it. If you know that after 2-3 hours there has been no sign of the parents, contact your nearest wildlife hospital for advice. If you have to transport it anywhere, ensure that you handle it as little as possible, wearing gloves, and take it immediately to the hospital or vet. Most vets will treat wild animals for free, however, it is best to check first to ensure they have experience with the species.


- **Accidentally knocking a nest whilst in the garden.**

Do not try to put back nests you have dislodged as you will not be able to secure it as well. Put it somewhere safe from predators, such as in a flowerpot on a wall. Again, avoid handling with bare hands and leaving your human scent on the nest. The parents may return and continue using the nest, or may build a new nest.

- **Cleaning out nest boxes.** This should only be undertaken between 1 September and 1 February. At other times of the year, it would be breaking the law. Remove any unhatched eggs and throw them away, do not be tempted to keep them.

- **If a nest is in an inconvenient place in your garden.** Unfortunately, in this circumstance you must still leave it until the young have flown off.
- **The nest is in an unsuitable place.** Whilst you may consider the nesting place unsuitable, birds are very good at choosing the best places to nest. Often, like Jemima, they return to places they have successfully raised young in the past. If you are concerned, the best way forward is to contact Natural England; this is the government agency for the protection of wildlife. If they advise removal, they will put you in touch with a professional who can supervise the removal which will ensure that the birds have the best possible chance of survival. Removal should never be attempted if there are eggs or unfeathered chicks in the nest as, in this case, the adults would almost certainly abandon the young.

We hope this advice is useful. Please do not be frightened to help wild animals; just remember to seek professional advice first.





## SIXTH FORM SUBJECT FOCUS: FOUNDATION LEARNING PROGRAMME

We are really lucky to be able to have a Foundation Learning Programme at Whitby School. This sees our learners accessing a range of different lessons which include, health and nutrition, Russian, English, maths, cooking, life skills, technology, art and music, to name a few. Students enjoy a variety of different activities throughout the week as well as being able to go on a number of different trips around the local area and beyond.

The students have been exceptionally lucky to have received tickets to the recent, 'Into the Film' festival held at local cinemas giving students a chance to go and watch new movies and have access to resources to support the learning around these. Most recently they were invited to watch the new 'Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle' movie, this gave them an opportunity to be able to practise their English skills and write reviews and take part in speaking and listening tasks which help them towards their final qualifications.

As well as being entered for formal qualifications, students are able to frequently gain AQA unit award certificates, which provide them with certified certificates from an exam board which are tailored to meet their curriculum and expected outcomes.

This year, students have been exceptionally lucky to have a number of external extra curricular trips out, these include Piglets Adventure Farm, museums, pantomimes, North Yorkshire Water Park, the Metro Centre, axe throwing, cinema visits and more recently London and trips to local farms and outside spaces. All of these trips help our students build resilience, encourage social skills, build teamwork skills and provide them with opportunities outside the classroom which may support gaining employment once they leave education.

As well as providing all of these opportunities, the Foundation Learning Group is there to support skills for life providing opportunities for students to become more independent in preparation for adulthood. Students are supported with writing CV's, applying for jobs locally and further afield as well as preparing for independent living in the future.

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about MINECRAFT



## WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Still the best-selling game of all time, Minecraft is a bastion of creativity and community, with hundreds of millions of players building and crafting in its almost endless world. The popularity of Minecraft among gamers of all ages means it's important to remain informed about the game, including how to play it safely and whether it's suitable for the children in your care. That's why we've created this guide explaining the risks associated with Minecraft and how to ensure a purely enjoyable gaming experience.

### SCARY ELEMENTS

While Minecraft can be seen as a kind of 'digital LEGO', certain game modes include creatures accompanied by eerie sound effects. These can be a bit too frightening for some younger players, potentially leading to distressing in-game combat and other encounters – although the combat is quite basic and free from any real depiction of violence.

### GRIEFING

Some players in Minecraft take pleasure in deliberately damaging or destroying another person's creations. This behaviour, known as 'griefing', is a form of bullying – it intentionally ruins someone else's experience by erasing hours of their work and forcing them to start over. Many public servers regard griefing as a serious offence and often ban those who engage in it.

### ADDICTIVENESS

Minecraft's focus on creativity means that, as with any creative endeavour, it can be easy to get carried away. If your child is finding it difficult to manage their time because they're drawn in by Minecraft's gameplay loop of resource gathering and building elaborate projects, it could have a knock-on effect on their social interactions and schoolwork.

### PUBLIC SERVERS AND COMMUNICATIONS

With public servers being so easily accessible in Minecraft, it's highly likely that children will end up chatting with strangers through the in-game text chat. Some servers even place an emphasis on social interaction, actively encouraging communication between players. While there's nothing inherently wrong with this, it does carry certain risks. In addition to the concerns around speaking with strangers online, players who host their own servers may have their IP addresses exposed, posing a further security concern.

### ADDITIONAL PURCHASES

Minecraft is available as a free trial on a variety of devices; however, the full game requires a one-off purchase, which is typically around £15. After that, players have the option to buy additional cosmetic upgrades or subscribe to Minecraft Realms. Realms is an entirely optional subscription service that allows users to run their own private server to play with friends. Without proper supervision, younger players may end up making unintended or excessive purchases.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

### CHOOSE THE RIGHT MODE

Selecting Creative or Peaceful mode allows children to play Minecraft without having to contend with enemies. It's also a great way for you to get used to playing the game with them, since the difficulty level is far lower. This allows you to work together on a long-term project, creating something special without the threat of enemies and creatures attacking you or damaging your building.

### HOST A PRIVATE SERVER

The easiest way to find a safe server for children to play on is to make one yourself. Hosting a server prevents strangers from finding it, unless they've been given its address and password. A private server also lets you control who's allowed to enter and – if necessary – ban anyone who shouldn't be there. This is the closest equivalent to parental controls in Minecraft. Hosting a private server, however, will cost a monthly fee.

### TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

At some point in their lives, almost everyone will make contact with a stranger online. Talking to children about online safety, therefore, is essential – as is having a plan for dealing with any hostile or difficult people. It's important that a child knows never to tell a stranger about themselves online and that they should come to you straight away if they do encounter a problem.

### RESEARCH CONTENT CREATORS

Much of Minecraft's early stages can be an exercise in frustration for players who don't know where to start. Thankfully, there's a wealth of material online and in video format to help you learn the basics. Just be mindful that some of this content may not be appropriate for children, so you should consider watching it yourself first.

### PLAY MINECRAFT WITH YOUR CHILD

As a creative building tool, Minecraft makes it great fun for children to team up and construct vast buildings accompanied by imaginative landscapes, much like working with LEGO or model kits. Playing in a game mode that includes enemies can encourage critical thinking and teamwork; however, you should consider which game mode is appropriate for the child in your care.


