TO OUR YEAR 6 AND YEAR 8 PARENTS

We wanted to write to you to personally express our gratitude for your support during one of the busiest weeks of the academic year - Transition!

We have been so impressed with the conduct of our pupils, both our new Year 6s (soon to be 7s!) who have taken their first step into secondary education, but also our Year 8s who have continued on their exciting journey by moving up to the Prospect Hill site. Over the last three days we have both seen numerous examples of beautiful manners, smart uniform, kindness and a commitment to learning, which is exactly what we had hoped to see during Transition.

We pride ourselves on being a values-led school: **ambition**, **character**, **courage** and **endeavour** are at the heart of all we do here. Your children have shown these in abundance and we are proud to have each and every one of them as part of our family at Whitby School.

Looking forward to September and the start of a busy term, we wanted to take the opportunity to remind all parents and carers of our expectations regarding equipment and uniform.

Uniform

We are a uniformed school as we believe this allows the character of our young people to shine. As such, our dress code is simple and practical:

- White shirt (long or short sleeved)
- Whitby School blazer

- Smart grey trousers, or grey pleated skirts, or grey tailored shorts
- plain, black polishable footwear
- Whitby School tie in house colour
- Whitby School Jumper (optional)

Please note, we do not permit leggings, sportswear or stretchy "yoga style" trousers.

More detailed information about uniform, including PE kit, can be found on the Uniform and Equipment section of our website, by following the Parents and Carers - Key Information links.

Please support your child in continuing to wear our uniform well and with pride, and get in touch with school where we may need to support by lending ties or other garments. We have a supply in school. It is important because at Whitby School character is not defined by the money a person can spend on clothes, or the jewellery that they wear. Character is who the child is, not what they wear – and we have some fantastic children at Whitby.

Other dress code rules:

- if ears have been pierced, one pair of plain studs may be worn. Earrings must be removed for PE
- a clear retainer may be worn whilst a new piercing is healing
- no other jewellery should be worn. This includes rings, nose studs, bracelets and wristbands etc.
- pupils will be asked to remove any non-uniform jewellery - staff may confiscate items not in line



with our dress code. If necessary, these will be kept in the school office until a parent or carer can collect them

- false/acrylic/gel nails and nail polish must not be worn
- discreet make-up is permitted
- natural hair colours only.

Equipment

It is essential that all pupils arrive equipped and ready to learn every day. This is a key part of the secondary school experience, as pupils begin to take responsibility for their own learning and develop crucial organisational skills.

We expect every pupil to have:

- a good sized school bag
- a pencil case, containing: black pens, a green pen, a pencil, ruler, rubber and a scientific calculator.
- if pupils forget their pencil case, they can let their form tutor or Care and Achievement Coordinator know before their first lesson of the day. Recurring issues with equipment will be marked as a "Concern" on Class Charts.

Additional information:

- mobile phones should not be seen whilst on site. They should be switched off and in the pupil's bag or locker. If a pupil is seen with their phone inside of the school building the phone will be confiscated by a member of staff

Support from parents/carers in ensuring pupils are smartly dressed and fully prepared for learning each day is critical to the smooth running of any school. 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WHITBY SCHOOL ROCKS!

This week saw the first whole school production by Whitby School, since the coming together of pupils, students and staff at both Eskdale and Caedmon schools - and what a fantastic success it has been!

Initial auditions took place in November and the cast have been rehearsing hard with the Director of the show, Mr Gaulter, since Christmas. One of the aims was to include as many pupils and students as possible and so we had a very strong chorus, dancers, pupil/ student-run backstage crew and dual cast for the lead roles - all who put on a total of four final performances over three days!

He presided over a rock and roll strong hold, the Hard Rock Cafe where the outcast 'Bohemians' lived: Zack, Rosie, Isla, Sophie, Nicole, Caitlin, Isabelle, Maya, Anna, Evangeline, Sophie, Morgan and Mia played these epic dudes that took their names from the heroes from the Rock Hall of Fame. Joining these Bohemians were the pair of Oz and Brit who searched





everywhere to find their 'dreamer'. Abbie and Elliot gave a brilliant performance despite being in Year 10 and Year 7 respectively! We then move on to the baddies! The duo of the sentient AI and her simpering lackey - Killer Queen and Khashoggi were played by the wickedly fantastic Molly and Emily who shared the role of Killer Queen and Safiya who successfully drew the hatred of the crowd as Khashoggi. The show couldn't have occurred without the wider support of the school and too many to name have offered and given support. Worthy of individual note however are Mr Matthewman who hand crafted the giant Brian May guitar and Mrs Winspear who created Killer Queen's throne! Mrs Beattie was nothing short of amazing in ensuring the vocals were top notch and Ms Dakin did an amazing job as our prompt, rehearsing with singers and cutting and editing songs to suit our needs. Mrs Alderson not only choreographed the dancers, but all the movement on stage and brought great enthusiasm to the cast as a whole.

We had huge audiences each night, starting with our upcoming Year 6 pupils who were treated to a sneak peak on Tuesday afternoon. Audiences only grew in number as each night progressed and on Thursday we welcomed nearly 130 people. Our audiences loved the show and ended each night with thunderous applause including a richly deserved standing ovation on the final night.

"Someone has donated money!" says Dad in an exuberant voice.

"What for?" I query.





"For the medicines you need!" said Mum. "From the new trials that we talked about."

Questions run through my brain. Who? Why? Why me?

"Who donated the money?" I ask.

"We don't know, but it doesn't really matter, love. All that matters is that we have some hope."

'REVISIONS' EXHIBITION

On Monday a group of Year 9 art pupils visited the 'Revisions' exhibition at the Pannett Art Gallery at Whitby museum. PROJECT DARE

Project Dare is an activity we have taken our pupils to for the last few years. It is organised by our career partners Inspiring Choices and also by York Cares. It gives the chance for a small group of pupils to work with an employer over the course of two days. Initially by finding out about the company and then by working on a project set by the employer. This time we were working with Nestle in York. Over the course of the two days our pupils visited York St John University and the Nestle factory in York. There they found out about the different steps that are taken to create a chocolate bar, specifically KitKat. They learnt about the different challenges a company has to overcome in

order to produce the chocolate bars and also about the very different jobs that are involved along the way. Finally we all got to see the last part of the production line in the factory which was really interesting. Our pupils also got the chance to work on a small project that Nestle had set for them. They acted with much maturity coming up with some fantastic suggestions and presented their ideas to their peers and the Nestle employees. Nestle were very impressed with our pupils and the work they had put into the project. It was a great couple of days and I am really proud of our pupils for their insight and hard work.

Dan was cross country captain for the North Yorkshire junior boys team down in Sussex this year following on from dominant performances at both District and Country rounds winning all four races comfortably ahead of any competition.

Dan is in actual fact an outstanding cyclist, currently on the British Cycling pathway which involves significant commitments in Glasgow and Manchester as often as possible. Breaking through in his first competitive season on the bike he has outperformed expectations and become a recognised name on the National scene.

A member of Manila Cycling Team, Daniel is hoping to secure a high profile team for next season based on this season's performances.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators STAYING SAFE AROUND WATER

Enjoying time in, on, and around water plays a vital role in a young person's overall development, offering a healthy and exhilarating way to have fun. This guide outlines essential safety advice, based on the Royal Life Saving Society UK's Water Safety Code, to help ensure children can enjoy swimming and similar activities safely and responsibly.

LIFEGUARD

STICK TO LIFEGUARDED AREAS 1

It's never advisable to enter unsupervised bodies of water, especially alone. Instead, it's considered best practice to accompany children to places with lifeguards, as they will be trained to respond swiftly in emergencies and provide first aid when needed.



When going to a new environment, it's important to research the local area and make children aware of safety signage before entering the water. If visiting the seaside, make sure children are always supervised by an adult and that they know what different beach flags mean, so they're knowledgeable of where and when they can enter the sea.

STOP AND THINK 3

Young people should be cautious before entering water, as it's difficult to know what hazards could be underneath. Use the Water Safety Code and encourage children to ask themselves questions such as, "Is the water too deep or too shallow? Are there currents, tides, or underwater objects?" Make sure children know never to enter water from a height, as what lurks below could cause serious injuries.

CONSIDER WATER TEMPERATURE 4

Even on hot days, water can be deceptively cold. Tragedies strike when young people experience cold water shock. Never let children enter water quickly; instead, ensure that they enter slowly and carefully to allow their bodies to adjust to the temperature or exit easily if needed

INFLATABLE 5 SAFETY

Although inflatables may seem like a fun idea when visiting locations like the beach, they can float further out from shore and into more dangerous water. It's advisable only to use inflatables in spaces like appropriately managed swimming pools, where they're used in more controlled and supervised environments.

SUPERVISION 6

For young children, and particularly those under the age of five, it's important for them to be supervised at home, outside and at the pool at all times. It's essential for parents and educators to understand that young children can drown quickly and silently; therefore, anyone supervising them must maintain constant watch in case they get into difficulty.



When swimming, especially in open water, it's best to teach children to stay within a safe depth. Share advice with them such as only entering water up to a standing depth, and in with the standing depth. the case of visiting the beach, swim parallel to shorelines. This will allow a child to stay in control and get out of the water easily

KEEP POOLS AND TUBS DRAINED 8

For parents of young children, a simple way to For parents or young children, a simple way to protect them at home is to keep outdoor spaces and bathrooms tidy after playtime. This includes removing water from paddling pools after use and turning them over, returning lids to hot tubs and taking toys out of baths, so all water come be fully drighted from the tub water can be fully drained from the tub.



6 If a child gets into difficulty in the water, they should try to float on their back, stay calm, and call for help. If a young person sees someone else in trouble, they should dial 999 or 112

immediately, then shout to reassure their friend, encouraging them to float on their back, and letting them know that help is on the way. Children should never enter the water to attempt a rescue or retrieve belongings





Beyond swimming lessons, children should be educated in school on water safety. Use RLSS UK's accredited programme, 'Water Smart Schools', which offers free lesson plans and resources on how to be safe on, near and around water by following the Water Safety Code.
