






Dear Parent/Carer

Important School Policy Reminder

It has come to our attention that some young people have been bringing peanut products and chocolate bars or sweets containing peanuts/nuts. Some children, across our two school sites, have life-threatening nut allergies and contact with peanuts/nut products could result in death. Please ensure your child is aware of this.

Free School Meals

The cost of a school meal will be £2.90 from September. If your child is entitled to a free school meal, the funding for this will be available on their account each day up to the value of the normal school meal. (Amounts spent above this must be paid for by putting additional money onto your child's account.) To check whether your child is entitled to a free school meal if they are not already claiming this, you will need to apply via North Yorkshire Council.

CAMBRIDGE CHALLENGE RESULTS!

Over the past year, Erin, Lola, Izzy and Emily have been working hard competing through various rounds of the 2024 Cambridge Biology Challenge.

This is the first time that a school from Whitby has entered a team into this competition and it is open to pupils/students from Year 10 through to Year 13. Our Year 10 (now Year 11) team worked on putting together presentations in response to Cambridge interview style questions, such as: 'What is the most incredible organism in your local area' (their conclusion: seaweed), 'If alien life existed, what might we predict about their biology?', 'Why don't animals have wheels?', and others, all in their own time. In all but one round, the team was awarded a distinction!

The icing on the cake came, however, when the team were invited to take part in a Celebration Day and awards ceremony at Homerton College, Cambridge University, during the summer holidays. Pictured here are the team during their visit to


Cambridge this August (there were two different days and they travelled on the days that they were available, hence the separate photos!).



PARENT GOVERNOR VACANCIES

Whitby School currently has two vacancies for parent governors on its new Governing Board, and therefore we are seeking nominations from eligible parents/carers of pupils at the school. The Governing Board, with the Headteacher, has overall responsibility for the running of the school.

The three core functions for Governing Boards are:

- > to ensure that the school has a clear vision, ethos and strategic direction;
- > to hold the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils;
- > to oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure its money is well spent.

You do not need any specific qualifications to be a governor. The most important thing is that you are interested in the success of the school and are prepared to play an active part in the work of the Governing Board. Parent governors are valued members of the team. An effective board will have a range of skills, and we would welcome nominations from parents with knowledge and experience in a range of areas that will complement our existing Governing Board. Parents with links to businesses are particularly welcome.

There are some circumstances under which someone cannot serve as a governor and these are detailed on the further information sheet enclosed. Training and support will be available to help the appointed governors to develop into the role. This will include in-house mentoring and support, as well as access to some external governor training. If you feel you can help in this capacity please contact the school office for a nomination form and related documents which will need to be completed and returned to a confidential email address, as stated on the form, no later than 12 noon on Friday 11 October 2024.

To be a parent governor, candidates will be required to:

- undergo a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check
- > sign a governors' Code of Conduct
- > provide details of relevant business and financial interests
- agree to the publication of some details on the school website and on the Get Information about schools service.

If there are more applications than vacancies then an election will need to be held. Should this be the case, parents will be contacted again with details about the voting process and information about the candidates standing for election.

FURTHER INFORMATION ABOUT PARENT GOVERNORS

Eligibility

To be eligible to stand for election as a parent governor you must have parental responsibility for, or care for, a child or young person registered at the school on the date of the election. This date is deemed to be the closing date for the receipt of nominations, or the date on which the governor position becomes vacant, if elections are being carried out in advance.

Disqualification

A parent is disqualified from standing for selection if they are:

- an elected member of the local authority
- > paid to work at the school for more than 500 hours in any consecutive 12 month period
- > subject to any of the disqualifications under the School Governance (Constitution) (England) Regulations 2012. Full details will be supplied with the nomination papers.

Term of office

The standard term of office is 4 years from the date of appointment. Parent governors may continue to serve their full term of office, even if their child leaves the school.

The role of the parent governor

The role of the parent governor is not as a spokesperson for the views of parents. They are the same as any other governor on the board, providing a 'parental viewpoint' – ie, representative of parents rather than representatives for parents.

Can you be removed from the role?

There are some circumstances where governors can be removed from their role. These include repeated non-attendance at meetings and for behaviours not in accordance with the code of conduct.

Frequency of meetings and time commitment required

Governors meet around once a month and at least termly as a whole-governing body. There may be sub-committee meetings outside of the main meetings and other events, such as link-governor roles and taking part in some school activities.

Nomination Process

Should you wish to complete a nomination paper for this role, please email **post@whitbyschool.co.uk** stating Parent Governor Nomination Form in the subject heading. The relevant forms will then be sent to you.

The deadline for completed nomination forms is 12 noon on Friday 11 October 2024.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? The video game Final Fantasy XIV launched in 2010, and, despite being critically panned, it saw an overhaul that has made it one of the biggest success stories in gaming. Its huge world, epic story and versatile combat system have continued to draw in new players, but there's a lot that trusted adults need to be aware of - not least the cost of paying monthly to play.



ALWAYS ONLINE

Final Fantasy XIV is an MMORPG, which stands for Massively Multiplayer Online Role-Playing Game. Much like World of Warcraft, players create a character in a chosen class and level up by completing quests to gain power and items. The game requires a constant internet connection, whether you're playing on PC, Mac, PlayStation or Xbox, and there's no option to

VOICE & TEXT CHAT

Final Fantasy XIV lets players send chat messages in-game or speak to each other over voice chat. On the one hand, that provides plenty of choice for how those enjoying the game can interact with their fellow fans. On the other hand, however, it's easier than in many games to receive unprompted messages from a stranger, with whom you constantly share your play space.

REGULAR EXPANSIONS

As with similar titles in the genre, players can purchase expansions to unlock additional content for the game. Those without the expansions will be locked out of certain new quests and activities, meaning that young people who play regularly will potentially have the next release earmarked on their calendar, ready to buy it as soon as possible.

VIOLENCE

While Final Fantasy XIV has a fairly light tone throughout some of its quests, many involve killing enemies and sometimes even wild animals. The violence isn't especially strong more comparable to a cartoon or anime style but the act alone may make some children feel uncomfortable, if they're not yet able to separate fictional harm from the real kind.

IN-GAME PURCHASES & SUBSCRIPTION FEE

Users need to pay £8.99 per month to play

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

As with World of Warcraft, there's an element o addiction to Final Fantasy XIV. The gameplay loop can be quite engrossing, as minutes turn into hours and hours into days while playing alone or with friends. This can potentially lead to missing real-life events, a lack of interest in any activities not related to the game and procrastination around responsibilities like

Users need to pay £8.99 per month to play Final Fantasy XIV, but there is a free trial. If someone stops paying, they'll lose access to their character (although they'll be able to pick up the payments again and resume where they left off). If a player forgets to cancel their payments, however, those subscription fees will continue rolling on automatically.

Advice for Parents & Educators

MANAGE PLAYTIME

30 Playtime limits are a great way to counter the addictive qualities of games like Final Fantasy XIV. They allow you discuss why it's still important to enjoy things outside of gaming while still letting a child enjoy playing online with their friends when it makes sense to do so. It's all well and good to have fun with a game.

PLAY TOGETHER

The free trial makes it extremely easy to jump into Final Fantasy XIV and play alongside a child, provided they're old enough. Not only does that help you ensure that settings are adjusted for their privacy and safety, but it may also end up becoming a bonding experience for you both and any other family members that

MAKE USE OF THE FREE TRIAL

The Final Fantasy XIV free trial is a generous one, with no limits on how long someone can play until their character hits level 70. That's easily dozens of hours for a child to go through the game, complete quests, and see if they enjoy it before purchasing expansions or subscribing to a membership. They may well move on to

REMEMBER, IT'S A PEGI 16

Despite its often-relaxing nature, Final Fantasy XIV carries a PEGI 16 rating for violence and drugs (although the latter is due to a character smoking a pipe on occasion). There's minimal blood, but characters can attack enemies (and other players) with weapons and spells. Take a look at some gameplay videos to see if


